Those who prefer a regular schedule will be assigned to and work with that student with reading or math on a weekly basis, or more than once weekly if you prefer. Volunteers will be officially trained on Monday, September 9 at 9:30 a.m. at Ashley. Returning volunteers who would like a refresher are welcome to attend the orientation, as well as anyone who is not sure if they want to volunteer and may want some additional information. The process to be a volunteer in the school system is simple, but you do need to be approved prior to volunteering in the schools. 

Somewhere We Are Human



Climate Corner—Help Highland Compost



If you were at the all-church picnic in August, you noticed our focus on reducing our waste. We collected our food waste which Natalie Sevin took to her farm, and we composted our plates, cups, napkins, and bowls. The only things that ended up that day in the landfill trashcans were our silverware, nametags, and some disposable food containers.

This is helpful considering the average American consumer produces just shy of five pounds of trash each day,

while a family creates about 18 pounds. That comes out to 1,642 pounds per person annually. In Europe the figure weighs in at just over one thousand pounds. Paper accounts for 13.1 percent of landfill material, plastics for 19.2 percent, and food is 21.9 percent.

At Highland, we are trying to do better. We all can be part of the solution especially as we gather for our fellowship meals this fall. Please look for the receptacles for food waste and compost and take the extra minute to separate your items. We can all take an active role in reducing the amount of trash we throw away. We will be surprised at the end of the meal when we see how little we have in the trash bins. Thank you for your help!
