
## **Advent Vespers Service** Sunday, Dec. 8, 5:00 p.m. in the Chapel








## Service Opportunities **Moore School Food Pantry**


#### **Coming in January** *The Life and Legacy of Dietrich Bonhoeffer, Beginning January* 5

#### **Climate Friendly Christmas Ideas**

As the little ones get excited, and we are scurrying about to 'fill' wishes, we found a few ideas to help keep the Christmas Season a bit eco-friendlier:

- Wrapping paper use PAPER wrapping paper that is recyclable and will break down. Paper that is shiny or does not tear easily is not recyclable.
- Cards send plant-able cards with pollinator plant seeds embedded in cards.
- Gift ideas gift reusable water bottles, plant-based phone cases, recycled paper bead or bracelet-making kits, wooden toys, organic bath bombs, homemade edible gifts.
- Ornaments make DIY Dried orange slices with fabric ribbon to mount on the tree, decorated pinecones with scrap fabrics, homemade wreaths, or cinnamon stick stars with fabric ribbons- the ideas are plentiful online.
